PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Parent/Caregivers

While teachers are working hard on the end of year reports I am working hard on planning for 2011 and beyond. First let me talk briefly about the end of year reports. I recently heard a parent claiming that their child's end of year report was being written by a computer. He was almost right, the end of year reports are written ON (not by) a computer. We have a software program called, "Easy School Reporting" though some of us are not so sure about the "easy" bit. It helps teachers organise assessment results to produce meaningful reports and it also helps us store report comments on a data base so that for example if a parent comes to talk to me about their child's performance I can quickly refer to the last few reports by looking on my desktop computer in the office (no more searching for copies and no more wasting paper on multiple copies to file in even more filling cabinets.)

The report comments section has always been difficult for teachers. In the old days we'd write them out by hand and in my case hope that parents, could decipher my scrawl. We'd also struggle with writing "could do better if he made an effort" (direct quote from most of my school reports) or something similar, ad nauseum.

Now teachers produce a "comment bank" to cover all of the various remarks that they want to write on student's reports. Then they can fill in each student's report using comments from the comment bank and adding additional things as needed. This saves writing the same things many times on many different reports and produces a greater consistency between reports. It's still time consuming but it is using the time much more effectively. So reports are not written by computers and children are not taught by computers. Any teacher who can be replaced by a computer obviously should be!

As to 2011 and beyond we are working on a school organisation that will build on the success of 2010. It looks at the moment as if we are going to have a very similar organisation of classes to what we have this year. I hope to make up the 2011 class lists in the second last week of this term. That's in about three week's time. We'll have to wait and see if any big change in our numbers happens at the start of the year (as it did in 2010) to change things but at this stage I am planning on starting the new classes from day one.

Our class organisation will reflect our commitment to lifting the performance of all students including those who have been doing well. We intend in fact to put a new emphasis on our provision for gifted and talented students and this will be reflected in the way that our composite classes in particular are organised. It's going to mean doing things a little differently to the way they have been done at Kariong but making things work better is one of the great challenges in any organisation.

In late news, because I write this on Wednesdays, our discos were a great success. We raised lots of money and the children had a fantastic time. Everyone was well behaved and a credit to their families and their schools. Well done Kariong kids you are just the best! Many thanks, to Mrs Kelliher and her band of parent volunteers for putting on four discos in two days. Thanks also to the twenty or so teachers who gave up their time to help with supervision. I know how hard they are working on reports so this was much appreciated.

REPORTED CASE OF SCARLET FEVER -Scarlet fever is an illness that sometimes occurs when your child gets strep throat. Kids with scarlet fever have a fever, rash, and a 'strawberry tongue'. Kids from five to fifteen are most at risk for contracting scarlet fever. Scarlet fever was once considered a life-threatening illness, but antibiotics have made it far less intimidating. Still, scarlet fever is very serious and needs to be treated by a doctor. Scarlet fever is caused by a strain of streptococcus bacteria. Streptococcus bacteria also cause streptococcal sore throat, or strep throat.

IS SCARLET FEVER SERIOUS? -Scarlet fever is rare, but serious. Left untreated, scarlet fever can result in infections of the heart, lungs, kidneys, skin, and nervous system. Complications of scarlet fever include rheumatic fever; bacteremia, a bacterial infection of the blood; an infection of the lining of the heart; and meningitis, inflammation of the brain and spinal cord, are less likely to occur if your child is treated soon after getting sick.

If your child has scarlet fever, keep them home until she/he is better to prevent the illness from spreading.

HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILD HAS SCARLET FEVER?

Scarlet fever is almost always accompanied by a sore throat and high fever. It usually comes on suddenly and may include symptoms such as:

- Nausea and vomiting
- Headache
- Difficulty swallowing
- A rash may appear on the second day of the illness. The rash looks a bit like sunburn and appears on the neck and torso, and in the folds of the arms, legs, and groin. The rash will probably last between two and five days and your child's skin might peel after the rash goes away.
- Kids with scarlet fever might also have a symptom called 'strawberry tongue', where the tongue looks redder than normal and the bumps on the tongue are bigger, making the tongue look a bit like a strawberry.

HOW DO I TREAT SCARLET FEVER?

Scarlet fever has to be treated by a doctor. Your child's doctor will probably give her antibiotics for the infection. You can give them paracetamol for fever, sore throat and body aches. Your child will probably be irritable and miserable, so make sure that they get lots of bed rest and liquids while she/he is sick. You can try using calamine lotion for the rash if your child is uncomfortable. Keep them away from other kids until they have been treated with antibiotics for at least one day to prevent spreading scarlet fever to others.
